7. Check Your Answer (and Make Sense of It!)

This is a crucial step often overlooked. Does the answer make sense in the context of the word problem? For example, if a problem asks how many apples someone bought and the answer is 500 apples, it might be an unreasonable answer for a typical scenario. Reread the problem and the answer to ensure logical consistency.
