 5. $Z(\text{HTT}) = 1$
 6. $Z(\text{THT}) = 1$
 7. $Z(\text{TTH}) = 1$
 8. $Z(\text{TTT}) = 0$

This random variable Z can take on values 0, 1, 2, or 3.

It's important to note that a random variable doesn't have to be a direct representation of the outcome. For example, in the coin flip

experiment, we could define a random variable W where $W(\text{Heads}) = 5$ and $W(\text{Tails}) = -2$. The choice of numerical values depends on what we want to measure or analyze about the random experiment.

Types of Random Variables:

Discrete vs. Continuous

Random variables are broadly classified into two main categories based on the nature of the numerical values they can take:

Discrete Random Variables

A **discrete random variable** is one that can only take on a finite number of values or a countably infinite number of values. This means there are "gaps" between the possible values. Think of them as distinct, separate numbers.

4. **Student's t-Distribution:** Useful for statistical inference when the sample size is small and the population standard deviation is unknown.
