For stitches like peyote or brick stitch, maintaining consistent tension is crucial. If you pull too tightly, your beadwork will curve. If you don't pull tightly enough, it will be loose and gappy. Practice on a small swatch before starting your bag.

Don't Be Afraid to Unravel

Mistakes happen! If you notice a flaw early on, it's always better to carefully unravel and redo that section than to leave a

noticeable error.

Bead Counts Matter

When following a pattern, count your beads meticulously. A single misplaced bead can throw off an entire row or section.

Reinforce Stress Points

Areas where straps attach or where the bag will experience the most stress (like the top corners) should be reinforced with extra stitching or by using a stronger thread.

Consider Bead Hole Size

Always ensure your needle and thread can pass through your chosen beads. Using beads with too small a hole for your thread can lead to frustration and breakage.

Lining for Durability and Polish

For a professional finish and added durability, consider lining your beaded bag with a coordinating fabric. This also prevents smaller items from slipping through any gaps in the beadwork.

Lighting and Magnification

Good lighting is essential for detailed beadwork. If you have vision challenges, a magnifying lamp or glasses can be a lifesaver.
