Exam essays require clear organisation and logical flow. Before you start writing, spend a few minutes planning your answer. A good essay structure typically includes:

1. **Introduction:** Briefly outline the question and your main argument or thesis. Define key terms if necessary.
2. **Body Paragraphs:** Each paragraph should focus on a specific point, supported by evidence (religious teachings, philosophical arguments, scholarly opinions). Use PEEL (Point, Evidence, Explanation, Link) or similar structures. Ensure you are addressing the question directly and providing critical analysis.
3. **Evaluation/Analysis:** Critically assess the arguments presented. Discuss differing viewpoints, counter-arguments, and the strengths and weaknesses of the positions discussed. This is where AO2 is demonstrated.
4. **Conclusion:** Summarise your main points and restate your thesis in light of the evidence presented. Avoid introducing new information.

Practicing Past Papers

Past papers are your most valuable revision tool. They provide:

1. **Familiarity with Question Styles:** Understand the types of questions asked, their wording, and their demands.
2. **Timing Practice:** Work under timed conditions to get a feel for how much you can achieve in the allotted time.
3. **Identification of Weaknesses:** After completing a paper, mark it rigorously (using the mark scheme) to pinpoint areas where you need further revision.

Don't just complete them; analyse them. Understand why certain answers receive higher marks. Look at examiner comments if available to grasp common mistakes and excellent approaches.

Developing Critical Thinking and Evaluation Skills (AO2)

A significant portion of marks in A-Level Religious Studies is allocated to analysis and evaluation (AO2). This means going beyond mere description to critically assess arguments, compare perspectives, and form reasoned judgments. To enhance your AO2 skills:

1. **Engage with Different Viewpoints:** Actively seek out and understand opposing arguments. For example, when discussing arguments for God's existence, also study arguments against it (e.g., the problem of evil, logical positivism).
2. **Question Assumptions:** Identify the underlying assumptions of arguments and assess their validity.
3. **Compare and Contrast:** Draw comparisons and contrasts between different religious beliefs,

ethical theories, or philosophical arguments.

4. **Formulate Your Own Judgements:** While evidence-based, your essays should reflect your own considered opinions, supported by your analysis.
