3. '**h**' controls horizontal translations (shifts). If $h > 0$, the graph shifts to the right by h units. If $h < 0$, the graph shifts to the left by $|h|$ units.
4. '**k**' controls vertical translations (shifts). If $k > 0$, the graph

shifts upward by k units. If $k < 0$, the graph shifts downward by $|k|$ units.

Horizontal Shifts and the Domain

Consider the function $y = \sqrt{x - 3}$. Here, $h = 3$. This means the entire graph of $y = \sqrt{x}$ is shifted 3 units to the right. The starting point of the graph moves from $(0,0)$ to $(3,0)$. Consequently, the **domain** of this function changes. The expression under the radical, $(x - 3)$, must be non-negative: $x - 3 \geq 0$, so $x \geq 3$. The domain is $[3, \infty)$. The range remains $[0, \infty)$.

Conversely, for $y = \sqrt{x + 2}$, $h = -2$. The graph shifts 2 units to the left, with its starting point at $(-2,0)$. The domain becomes $x + 2 \geq 0$, or $x \geq -2$, which is $[-2, \infty)$.

Vertical Shifts and the Range

Now, let's look at vertical shifts. In the function $y = \sqrt{x} + 4$, $k = 4$. This shifts the graph of $y = \sqrt{x}$ upward by 4 units. The starting point moves from $(0,0)$ to $(0,4)$. The **range** of this function is affected. Since $\sqrt{x} \geq 0$, then $\sqrt{x} + 4 \geq 4$. The range is $[4, \infty)$ or $y \geq 4$. The domain remains $[0, \infty)$.

For $y = \sqrt{x} - 1$, $k = -1$. The graph shifts 1 unit downward, with its starting point at $(0,-1)$. The range becomes $y \geq -1$, or $[-1, \infty)$.

Stretches, Compressions, and Reflections

The coefficients 'a' and 'b' introduce more dramatic changes. For

$y = 2\sqrt{x}$, ' a ' = 2. This causes a vertical stretch by a factor of 2. The graph is 'pulled' upwards, making it steeper. For $y = (1/2)\sqrt{x}$, ' a ' = $1/2$, resulting in a vertical compression, making the graph flatter.

A negative ' a ' value, like in $y = -\sqrt{x}$, causes a reflection across the x-axis. The graph now opens downwards.

Horizontal transformations with ' b ' work similarly but affect the x-axis. For $y = \sqrt{2x}$, ' b ' = 2, resulting in a horizontal compression. The graph is squeezed towards the y-axis. For $y = \sqrt{x/2}$, ' b ' = $1/2$, leading to a horizontal stretch. The graph is widened.

A negative ' b ' value, like in $y = \sqrt{-x}$, causes a reflection across the y-axis. The graph now opens to the left.

Solving Square Root Equations: Isolating the Radical

Beyond understanding the functions themselves, Algebra 2 students are tasked with solving **square root equations**. These are equations where the variable appears under a radical sign. The primary strategy for solving these equations is to isolate the radical term and then square both sides of the equation to eliminate the square root.

The Squaring Process and Extraneous

Solutions

Consider the equation $\sqrt{x + 1} = 3$. To solve this, we first square both sides:

$$(\sqrt{x + 1})^2 = 3^2$$

$$x + 1 = 9$$

$$x = 8$$

However, a critical step when solving radical equations is to **check for extraneous solutions**. Squaring both sides of an equation can sometimes introduce solutions that do not satisfy the original equation. In our example, plugging $x = 8$ back into the original equation: $\sqrt{8 + 1} = \sqrt{9} = 3$. Since $3 = 3$, $x = 8$ is a valid solution.

Let's look at an equation that might produce an extraneous solution: $\sqrt{x - 5} = -2$. If we blindly square both sides:

$$(\sqrt{x - 5})^2 = (-2)^2$$

$$x - 5 = 4$$

$$x = 9$$

Now, let's check $x = 9$ in the original equation: $\sqrt{9 - 5} = \sqrt{4} = 2$. However, the original equation stated that $\sqrt{x - 5}$ equals -2. Since $2 \neq -2$, $x = 9$ is an **extraneous solution**. This highlights why checking solutions is paramount when solving radical equations. The fundamental property of the square root function is that it yields a non-negative result, so it can never equal a negative number.

Applications of Square Root Functions in the Real World

While abstract in their definition, square root functions are surprisingly prevalent in real-world applications, making their study in Algebra 2 incredibly practical. They appear in various scientific and engineering disciplines, offering models for phenomena that exhibit non-linear relationships.

Physics and Engineering: Velocity, Distance, and Time

One classic application is in physics, particularly in calculating the velocity of an object under constant acceleration. The formula for the final velocity (v) of an object starting from rest is often given by $v = \sqrt{2ad}$, where 'a' is acceleration and 'd' is distance. Here, velocity is directly related to the square root of the distance traveled.

In engineering, **square root functions** are used in calculating the frequency of oscillation in a spring-mass system ($f = 1/(2\pi) * \sqrt{k/m}$, where k is the spring constant and m is the mass) or in fluid dynamics to model the speed of a fluid flowing through a pipe. The **practical math** of square root functions is diverse.

Geometry and Measurement: Diagonal

Lengths and Areas

The Pythagorean theorem, a fundamental concept in geometry, involves squares and square roots. The length of the diagonal of a rectangle with sides 'l' and 'w' is given by $d = \sqrt{l^2 + w^2}$. This is a direct application of a square root function where the diagonal length depends on the square root of the sum of the squares of the sides.

Similarly, when calculating the area of an equilateral triangle given its side length 's', the formula involves a square root: $A = (s^2/4)\sqrt{3}$.

Finance and Economics: Risk and Growth Models

In finance, square root functions can appear in models related to risk and return. For example, the standard deviation of an investment's return, a measure of its volatility or risk, is often calculated using square roots. They can also be used in more complex economic models where growth rates are not constant.

Mastering Square Root Functions for Future Success

The study of **square root functions** in Algebra 2 is more than just memorizing formulas; it's about developing a deep understanding of how these functions behave, how they can be manipulated, and how they model real-world scenarios. By

mastering their properties, including domain, range, graphical transformations, and the techniques for solving radical equations, students equip themselves with essential mathematical skills that will serve them well in subsequent math courses like pre-calculus and calculus, as well as in various STEM fields.

The ability to visualize the graph, understand the impact of transformations, and accurately solve equations involving radicals are key indicators of proficiency. As students progress, they will encounter more complex **radical expressions** and functions, but the foundational knowledge gained in Algebra 2 regarding square root functions will provide a solid framework for tackling these challenges.
